

# **AGM REPORT**

The 96th Annual General Meeting was opened by the President, Professor Bill Russell with the remark that there were only four more meetings to go until we celebrate our Centenary.

He described the year as having begun with three substantial challenges: a severe financial deficit from the previous year, the collection under threat from an inadequate building and membership declining.

Facing these risks he was able to report that the Council had reduced the deficit from \$52,000 to \$12,000, that the Department of Sustainability and the Environment had replaced the southern portion of the roof thereby protecting the collection from water damage, and that action is being taken to improve membership numbers. He added that risk management has become integral to the purpose of Council.

2005 had been a year of looking outwards: The History Victoria Support Group, under the leadership of Joan Hunt had delivered well attended regional and metropolitan workshops and the major exhibitions Making Tracks and History, Community, Identity had created new networks.

### TWO FELLOWS WERE ELECTED:

# Mimi Colligan

Mimi left school at an early age being a severe asthmatic and completed her primary schooling by correspondence. Family responsibilities saw her enter tertiary studies as a mature age student.



Long interested in performing arts, Mimi is recognized as an authority on 19th Century popular culture in Australia and is, as far as is known, the only historical researcher working on a detailed history of Australasian panorama entertainment.

During her professional life Mimi has been involved in researching and writing. As Senior Research Officer for Australia Post, she was the author of several heritage publications in the Rush for Gold series, while as Victorian Researcher for the ADB, she wrote some fifteen entries for the publication. Mimi is also a contributor to the recently published Encyclopaedia of Melbourne. Mimi was appointed Research Associate to the National Centre for Australian Studies, Faculty of Arts, Monash University - a position she still retains - and authored the book Canvas Documentaries, published by MUP in 2002.

A guest contributor providing essays, articles, reviews and commentary for journals, newspapers and radio, Mimi is in demand as a speaker in educational and professional circles. Appointed a Councillor RHSV 1989-1995, her eleven-year membership of the Research and Collections Committee provided that group with wise counsel and much practical assistance. The Committee appreciates her ongoing interest in the performing arts component of the Collection. Mimi is currently a member of the [RHSV] Publications Committee. Presently working on her next book on stage life in 19th century Victoria, Mimi's nomination as a Fellow of the Society is recognition of the contribution her research has added to our knowledge of life in the times of settlement of the Colony.

# John Lahey

John Lahey is a distinguished Melbourne journalist whose long-running column in the Age, 'Lahey at Large', did much to inform public discussion of history and heritage issues. He is a member of

the Surrey Hills Historical Society and of the Canterbury History Group and a frequent speaker to historical societies, especially in recent times about Australian federation and the Eureka Stockade. His interest and participation in



commemoration of Eureka have been recognised by Eureka's Children who have made him an honorary member. His notable Faces of Federation: an illustrated history was published by the RHSV in 2000 and attracted a Centenary of Federation grant. His other writings include Damn You John Christie!: the public life of Australia's Sherlock Holmes (State Library of Victoria,1993). More recently, he has done the onerous job of judging the Community History awards since the program's inception.

**Alleyne Hockley** nominated by Castlemaine Historical Society. Alleyne's leadership and vision in resurrecting the Castlemaine Historical Society from a Society that languished in the basement of the Art Gallery, has led to a dynamic Society that now occupies the Old Courthouse Building. Alleyne's skill in developing the collections, volunteer training and high standards of exhibition and innovative projects continues to raise the bar for Castlemaine Historical Society.

Sandra Kimmins nominated by Gisborne and Mount Macedon Districts Historical Society. The Society highlighted Sandra's outstanding commitment to the Society as Secretary and the many valued additional research and indexing tasks Sandra performs, so central to the Society's activities.

Sue Law nominated by Eltham and District Historical Society. Sue has made a distinguished contribution to the Society serving as President and Vice President between 1985 – 1998 achieving the smooth administration of the Society, as well as more permanent accomplishments such as the establishment of the Andrew Ross Museum at Kangaroo Ground. Since retiring as President Sue has maintained her involvement with the Society particularly in the computerisation of the Society's records.


### **BOOK LAUNCH**

# "Jubilee of TV"

Television officially started in Australia (actually, only Sydney and Melbourne at first) in 1956 – just in time for the Melbourne Olympic Games. For many Australians, television was an important symbol: economically, it heralded the end of post-war austerity; and culturally, it represented a shift away from England and towards the United States.

Up until about 1965, when television began to lose its novelty in Australia, there was a concerted effort among various "taste-makers" to create a domestic environment which was designed and organized around the demands of watching television- in other words a 'TV house'. This influenced many aspects of people's everyday lives, such as the layout of the lounge room, the design of furniture, the way people cooked and ate their food, the design of clothes, the design of heating and lighting.

The speaker, Dr Derham Groves is a Senior Lecturer in Architecture at the University of Melbourne. His interest in television from the point of view of research began in 1992 when he was doing a PhD in Arts with Professor Karal Ann Marling, the author of As Seen on TV: The Visual Culture of Everyday Life in the 1950s (1994) at the University of Minnesota. He organized (along with John Arnold and Jenny Hocking from Monash University) the conference 40 Years of Television, in 1996 at the Australian Centre for Australian Studies, Monash University. He was the curator of the television component of the exhibition, 1956: Melbourne, Modernity and the xv1 Olympiad in 1996 at the Museum of Modern Art at Heide. He wrote the book, TV Houses: Television's Influence on the Australian Home, 2004, Black Jack Press.

# Charles Joseph La Trobe, the forgotton Governor

Charles Joseph La Trobe is a shadowy figure in Australian history even though he presided over some of the most important and decisive events in the development of the Port Phillip District. After eleven years as Superintendent of this outpost of New South Wales, he was appointed the first Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria, a post he filled with mixed success. Nevertheless, he is astonishingly little known as a person. In the 2006 RHSV - La Trobe Society AGL Shaw Annual Lecture, Dianne Reilly will explore the reasons why La Trobe may be described today as 'the forgotten Governor'.

Dianne Reilly is La Trobe Librarian at the State Library of Victoria where she manages the Heritage Collections. She completed her doctorate in the History Department at the University of Melbourne in 2003, and continues her interest in the subject of her thesis as Secretary of the La Trobe Society. Her publications include Sun Pictures of Victoria: the Fauchery-Daintree Collection, 1858 with Jennifer Carew (Currey O'Neil Ross, 1983), and Charles Joseph La Trobe Landscapes and Sketches (State Library of Victoria with the Tarcoola Press and the National Trust of Australia (Victoria), 1999), and most recently La Trobe: the Making of a Governor with Melbourne University Publishing. She is currently working on an edition of La Trobe's Australian Diaries.

# Dr Howitt's Corner: a civilized centre of early Melbourne

Amongst the earliest Port Phillip settlers, the Howitts played an eminent but private role in the weaving of Melbourne's social fabric. The first four decades of the colony's history frame a colourful canvas featuring three generations of this vibrant Quaker family. Part of an intimate group clustered around the Lieutenant-Governor, the Howitts were engaged in an extraordinary range of cultural, scientific and philanthropic activity in early Melbourne. They knew everyone of note from Charles Joseph La Trobe and Justice Sir Redmond Barry down, as well as all the artists, writers, scientists, intellectuals and explorers in town. The focus of this talk will be on the Howitt's contribution to the dawning artistic and cultural life of colonial Melbourne.

Caroline Clemente was born and educated in Melbourne. After completing a B.A. at the University of Melbourne, she lived in Europe for ten years during which time she took out a B.A. (Hons) in Art History from the Courtauld Institute, London University. In Florence, she pursued postgraduate study and worked at the Uffizi and Pitti Galleries and at the Harvard Center for Renaissance Studies. Back in Australia, she tutored in the Fine Arts Department at Melbourne University followed by ten years as Curator of Prints and Drawings at the National Gallery of Victoria. She is author of Australian Watercolours in the National Gallery of Victoria, 1802-1926, and the "Catalogue of Plates" for Brenda Niall's biography of Georgiana McCrae. This talk is based on research for her recently completed M.A. degree from the University of Melbourne, entitled, "The Private Face of Patronage: the Howitts, Artistic and Intellectual Philanthropists in early Melbourne Society".

# THE VOYAGE of the DUYFKEN REPLICA



The voyage of the Duyfken replica is an initiative of the National Steering Committee of "Australia on the Map 1606-2006" [AOTM], conducted in a partnership with the Australian Government (through the Department of Environment and Heritage) and the Duyfken Replica Foundation.

The Duyfken Replica Foundation will sail the ship to 25 harbours along the Australian coast. Four Victorian ports will host the replica:

Port Fairy: 9 Jun – 13 Jun-06 • Geelong: 16 Jun – 20 Jun-06
Docklands: 21 Jun – 28 June-06 • Williamstown 29 June – 5 July-06

# Australia on the Map: 1606-2006

Rather than focusing on commemorating just one mariner, Willem Janszoon, the first to have charted part of the Australian coast in the Duyfken, the theme "Australia on the Map: 1606 - 2006", allows for broader and more inclusive commemorations and studies. The focus, then, is on the sequence of fascinating and epic voyages and contacts which, when combined, put Australia's coasts on the world map. Furthermore, it offers an opportunity to bring history that is not well-known to the attention of Australians.

To quote the AOTM website:

The "Australia on the Map" theme was decided upon at a very early stage at the suggestion of then Vice President Allen Mawer. It reflects the fact that the crew of Duyfken made a chart, copies of which still exist, of west Cape York in 1606. The world at large only became aware of our continent when that chart was incorporated into regional maps, such as the Gerritsz Map of 1622. The theme was chosen as well because it acknowledges each state as it was added to the growing outline of Australia, some from a very early stage. Apart from Queensland in 1606, WA was first represented in 1616, NT in 1623, SA in 1627, Tasmania in 1642 and finally Victoria and NSW in 1770. However, the theme is intended to be inclusive not only of the states but all the different peoples who participated in some way in the process of unveiling Australia, the Dutch, Indigenous Australians, Spanish, Macassans from Indonesia, French, English, Swedish and so on. It embraces the fact that we are not only a multi-cultural society but also have a multi-cultural contact history. [http://www. australiaonthemap.org.au]

ATOM originated in 2002. The Chair of its National Commemoration Council is Vice-Admiral Chris Ritchie AO RANR.

Peter Reynders is its President. Each State has an organising committee. For Victoria the Patron of the State Steering Committee is Commodore (Ret.) Dacre Smyth and the Chair, Professor Victor Prescott. Peter Yule, Vice-President, RHSV, is a member of that Committee.

Additional to the visit of the Duyfken replica, as detailed above, the Victorian program has included a symposium on the

subject 'Dutch migration to Australia: The case of the 'Indisch' Dutch'. There was a double book launch of *Recalling the Indies:* colonial culture and postcolonial identities (Joost Coté and Loes Westerbeek (eds), Aksant, Amsterdam, 2005 and *The Dutch move down under:* 1606-2006 (Dr Nonja Peters (ed.), Wolters Kluwer, 2006). # 4 Miles to Melbourne, 69 miles to Mount Alexander

A catchy phrase, a possible book-title — but where are we? Opposite the remnants of a rockery, the rest removed to the old cricket oval site, which itself now sports a fine avenue of mature elms planted immediately the curator learnt of the cricket club's departure. Behind us a town hall, whose ballroom a number of us had visited when younger, so convenient because of its closeness to public transport. It was by public transport that most of the RHSV's excursion party in April travelled to and from the Essendon — Moonee Ponds district. And it was by foot that we learnt about local life and the way the locality developed.

Walking is the best way to come to grips with the characteristics of a community. Under the careful, well-informed guidance of Lenore Frost, assisted by local personalities along the way, we started at Essendon railway station and snaked southwards to the Moonee Ponds and Essendon Historical Society's rooms. Among houses and schools built for both 'bosses' and workers, as well as a selection of churches, we passed examples from the 1880s onwards, discovering links between this suburb, its neighbours and the city. Our three-course 'Helen Broad' lunch (what a 'trade-name') was enjoyed in the Historical Society's rooms - the former Court House. Lenore and Aleyne also introduced us to the Society's activities, publications and most recent exhibition about local sporting personalities and their accomplishments, including some Olympians. It is clear that the historical society is a central and useful community member. Afterwards, we walked the Moonee Ponds retail precinct, discovering its 'secret' residential history and the functional changes in building use.



Our thanks to Lenore and her Society for organising and conducting this full day excursion. # Behind the scenes

Many members will have read with interest Simon Nasht's article 'Hell's Witness', about the war photography of Hubert Wilkins in the Weekend Australian Magazine (April 15–16 2006, pp 16–18).

Four of the striking images reproduced to accompany that article were included in the items considered for the Society's exhibition on the theme of volunteering for military service from colonial Victoria to World War I. These came to us in an album, part of donation from Senator the Hon. George F. Pearce - the album being presented to him' ... .with the compliments of Andrew Fisher, October 20th, 1919.

Other photographic material donated to the Society by Senator Pearce includes albums recording Ministerial visits to Borroloola NT, Alexandria Cattle Station, Queensland and Thursday Island (1922–1923), and, much closer to home, to the Commonwealth Clothing Factory, South Melbourne (c. 1912). Sir George Pearce represented Western Australia from 1901–36, during which he served as Defence Minister over four periods totalling 12 years.

# Community Heritage Grants

The Community Heritage Grants (CHG) program aims to preserve and provide access to nationally significant Australian cultural heritage material held by community groups across the country by providing cash grants of up to \$10 000.

The program is funded by the Australian Government and managed by the National Library of Australia with support provided by the Department of Communications, Information Technology and the Arts, the National Archives of Australia, the National Film and Sound Archive and the National Museum of Australia.

This year funding is available for projects to improve the preservation of nationally significant cultural heritage collections held by community groups across the country and to provide preservation and collection management training to improve the skills of staff and volunteers working with cultural heritage materials.

Supported by the Victorian Government and *The Weekly Times*, the Awards aim to promote good heritage planning and appropriate new development in regional Victoria, recognizing towns that have strived to retain their unique characteristics.

Speaking at the launch of the Awards, Anthony Knight, Deputy Chair of the National Trust said "Country towns and regional centres have played an essential role in the development of Victoria. As we approach our next 50 years it is imperative that heritage preservation is promoted to continue to conserve the many regional towns so vital to Victoria's character".

Nominations are invited for the four Award categories:

- 1. The town with the most intact heritage streetscape character
- 2. The town that has best interpreted its heritage for visitors
- The public landscaping project which has been most sympathetic to the historic character of the town
- 4. The best regional heritage event
