RHSV receives rare collection

In December 2006, the RHSV was very fortunate to receive the wonderfully intact collection of Australia's first and last surviving Lodge of the Grand United Order of Free Gardeners, a friendly society that was established in Melbourne 140 years ago.

The Order was established when the Grand Lodge of Scotland granted a charter to open a Lodge in Victoria, and the first meeting took place on 19 July 1864 with 25 members. The order spread to most Australian states and eventually there were 25 in Victoria.

The origins of the Order are obscure but it is believed to have started in Scotland in the 17th century as a fraternity to promote and regulate the trade of working gardeners. By the 19th century the Order was more active as a workers'



benefit society providing sickness benefits, pensions and provision for dependents. Non-gardeners who began joining were called 'free gardeners' and soon they outnumbered working gardeners.

This significant collection includes examples of the Order's regalia, ceremonial objects, honour boards, framed certificates and photographs, minute books, treasurer's books and accounts, correspondence and other documents. Also included are records of other defunct Orders in Victoria, making it a treasure trove for the detail of Victoria's Free Gardener societies, their members and their activities. We thank the last members of Victoria's oldest Order of Free Gardeners for their foresight in seeking to preserve this valuable record of their 140 year history in Victoria.

The Grand United Order of Free Gardeners voted to wind up after the corporate regulator determined that the society could not meet new standards of compliance and governance.

OBITUARIES

Hon. Roy Hector Ward

9-12-1923 - 19-12-2006

Born and educated in Wangaratta, Roy Hector Ward, Liberal Member of the Legislative Council of Victoria for the South-Eastern Province from 1970 to 1988, was a council member of the RHSV from 1975-95, and Vice President from 1987-91. He was a keen supporter of the history of the State. He died at the Mornington Peninsula Hospital on 19 December 2006 at the age of 83.

His particular interest in local and Victorian history led him to be a member and president of the Mordialloc Historical Society (1964-65), and Vice President of the South-Eastern Historical Association from 1964-71 (and office -bearer to 1994). He was a member of the History Advisory Council of Victoria from 1975-85, and from 1980-85 he chaired the Victoria's 150th Celebrations Local and Regional Committee. It was in this position that his Committee organized the distribution of funding in 1984-85 for local celebrations including historical events, memorials and publications, all of which proved a busy time for the State's historical societies. Roy was awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) in 1990. The Society honours one of its valued Council members who made a significant and lasting contribution to the local history movement and extends its deepest sympathy to his wife, Joan and family.

This select concentration on Roy Ward's contribution to the support of history should be read in conjunction with his entries in *Who's Who in Australia* and an obituary in The Age 10 Jan 2007 p. 11 (written by Lindsay Thompson).

VHJ Vol 74 ~

New Index Available

We are pleased to advise members that their access to the contents of their Journal has been further enhanced. With the completion of the comprehensive index to VHJ Volume 74 (Issues 259 and 260), members can now retrieve extensive index entries for Volumes 1 to 74 (1911 to 2003) and information about all titles and authors of articles and reviews for Volumes 75 – 77 (2004–2006).

The computer searchable index is available in the RHSV library and on the Society's website: go to the RHSV homepage and click on the link to the index (which is about halfway down the page). Hints on searching the VHJ Database database are given on the website, but refer to the February 2005 issue of *History News* for a more complete description on techniques for its use.

The RHSV again acknowledges and thanks John Adams, Fellow of the Society, for his contribution in preparing the index of just under 1000 separate entries. (His second in a year.) Richard Barnden prepared it for computer searching and Vicki Court ensured its place on the RHSV website.

John Knight

29.02.1920 - 8.11.2006

Volunteer colleagues, present and past staff and Councillors at the RHSV were saddened at the news of the death of John Knight.

John joined the RHSV volunteer corps about 18 years ago, not long after the Society moved to the Mint Building. For the RHSV he undertook a variety of tasks extending from researching enquiries on all manner of subjects (often drawing on his geology, mining and railway background and experiences) to carpentry (particularly notable being his involvement in the revamping of the basement at the Mint for use by Curator Lorenzo Iozzi and the housing of the Images Collection). When we moved to the Drill Hall, John continued in research pursuits, the application of carpentry skills to the Library

fit-out (where adjusting the bookshelves to everchanging needs was a persistent undertaking) and provision of support our Office Manager. For all the forgoing, in 2004 John received the RHSV's Award of Merit.

The Society was represented at John's impressive and characteristically distinctive funeral, which was conducted with great support from the railway historical societies of which he was also a member. Indeed he was honoured by the Puffing Billy Preservation Society by a Special Narrow Gauge Funeral Train which conveyed his coffin in a QR wagon. His passion for life revolved around family, friends, rocks, train travel and all things historical in nature. He will remembered fondly and for his friendly personality and dry sense of humour.

Right Behaviour – Coranderrk in 1880s

Speaker: Richard Broome

While land was the dominant factor in Indigenous-settler encounters in Australia, right behaviour played an important role on the Aboriginal side, which has often been underplayed by historians. This paper focuses on Coranderrk reserve in Victoria around 1880 and listens to the voices of Aboriginal witnesses embedded in a parliamentary inquiry to explore right behaviour, which was expressed in complaints over rations and governance. I will argue, using a complex view of patron-client relations, that while the issuing of rations had been seen as a site of white power, at Coranderrk it provided a vehicle for Aboriginal power.

Richard Broome is Associate Professor of History at La Trobe University and Head of the History Program. He has taught Australian and Aboriginal history at various universities for thirty years. He is the author of seven books, including Arriving (1984), a history of immigration to Victoria. His most widely known work is Aboriginal Australians (Allen & Unwin, 1982) a history of Aboriginal people in Australia since 1788, which is now in its third edition (2001). His recent book Aboriginal Victorians, A History Since 1800 (Allen & Unwin, 2005), has been short listed three times and has won the NSW Premier's Australian History Prize (2006).

Helen Botham is a gardener and garden lover with a deep interest in heritage. She will talk us through the garden which Victoria's first head of Government, Charles Joseph La Trobe, developed on the twelve and a half acres of his Jolimont estate between 1840 and 1854. A walk round my garden', the subtitle of Helen's recently published book on the topic, is from La Trobe's title for the last chapter of his intended memoirs, and for which he commissioned drawings by his cousin Edward La Trobe Bateman. A selection of these and other illustrations will accompany the talk. Helen's book will be available for sale.

With imaginations stimulated, a 'feet on the ground' experience of today's Jolimont will locate the past in the present. Following the talk, there will be an opportunity (using own Travelcards) to take a short train ride from Flagstaff to Jolimont and have Helen guide us around the site itself, which still overlooks some of the Melbourne parklands which are part of the La Trobe legacy. This part of the afternoon will take about an hour.

The Red Steer: Cultural expressions and bushfire understanding

Victoria is historically Australia's most bushfireprone state. Yet very few Victorians will ever experience a bushfire first hand. So how do we come to understand the place of fire in our environment, where are those meanings drawn from and how has this changed over the years? While many people draw their knowledge of bushfire from the news media, a range of other interesting and sometimes curious sources have long played a role.

John Schauble is a postgraduate student in environmental history at the University of Melbourne. His research is centred on cultural influences that affect community perceptions of bushfire. During more than 20 years as a journalist with The Age and The Sydney Morning Herald, in addition to maintaining a focus on international news and a term as a correspondent in China, John also reported extensively on bushfires. He is the author of The Australian Bushfire Safety Guide (HarperCollins, 2004). A long-time volunteer fire-fighter with the Country Fire Authority (CFA), he is Captain of the Sassafras-Ferny Creek brigade in the Dandenong Ranges. He also works as a CFA community bushfire educator and in the CFA's State Emergency Co-ordination Centre.

What does an inch of rain mean?

The northern plains country is ethereal. It is a barometer of seasonal shifts, its physical changes far more dramatic than those of treed country. Like its adjectival namesake, it is country without embellishment, without pretension. And yet this is to underestimate the complexity of the plains, for it is a country of stark contrasts — of both abundance and scarcity.

It is the theme of scarcity that Robyn explores in this paper. Visions pursued by settlers and policy makers as they interpreted and interacted with the northern plains of Victoria centred on the provision of a water supply. In this current period of extended dry, water shortages in regional Victoria again loom large. Through an exploration of the evolution of the cultural landscape of the northern plains, historical themes that have shaped our contemporary attitudes to water are highlighted.

Robyn Ballinger is an historian who has had extensive experience in the writing and research of histories in regional Victoria. Robyn has a love of history and she is currently building on her expertise in this area as a PhD candidate in the Department of History at the University of Melbourne.

Historically Speaking, Urban, Suburban, Bush (HS USB)

Commencing at BWM Edge, Federation Square and the State Library of Victoria, the History Council of Victoria's flagship public history seminar series will also tour to museums, libraries and heritages spaces in suburban and bush locations state-wide. *Historically Speaking Urban Suburban Bush* brings explores different historian perspectives associated with Australia's war, sport, entertainment and criminal pasts.

Making History Workshops

To assist history-lovers of all ages and inclinations with the research and promotion of their historical interests, HCV brings together a diverse group of historians for a series of history-skill workshops in selected regional locations. In these workshops attendees will explore the practice and ethics of oral history, researching and reading primary documents, new approaches and ideas associated with local and family history.

Connecting History Communities (CHC)

Through the Connecting History Communities initiative, HCV will identify and link existing and emerging history communities and history-lovers through a new state-wide online communications network that profiles history people and projects, ideas and opinions.

History Roadshow 07 (HR07)

Visiting Year 11 and 12 students in selected regional locations throughout Victoria, HCV's History Roadshow 07 provides students in Australian History, Revolutions and Renaissance History with specifically-tailored presentations closely related to their curricula. A session entitled 'Making a Future out of the Past:Thinking about a career or tertiary study in History', is also available to lower secondary school classes. In 2007 professional historians Dr Richard Trembath and Dr Adrian Jones will be accompanied by outstanding postgraduate historians from Victoria's key tertiary institutions.

Applied History in the Community Project (AHC)

The Applied History in the Community subject aims to bridge young historians with professional and retired history-lovers through collaborative projects concerned with the research and writing of local stories of people and place.


Fay Anderson, An Historian's Life, Max Crawford and the Politics of Academic Freedom, MUP E-Book, Melbourne University Press, Melbourne, 2005, xi + 359 pp., \$49-95. ISBN 0 522 85153.3. Crawford came to the University of Melbourne as professor of history in 1937 and became a towering figure in the study of history in Australian universities and schools, especially in Victoria. He was also a notable public intellectual who spoke out in defence of intellectual autonomy and was widely regarded as radical. He also served as a diplomat in the Soviet Union during the Second World War. His apparent backflip in 1961 when he claimed that there was evidence of Communist conspiracy in the university soured his considerable reputation. This is a major biography dealing mainly with the public life of an important figure.

Christena Kovesi, *Pitch Your Tents on Distant Shores, A History of the Sisters of the Good Shepherd in Australia, Aotearoa/New Zealand and Tahiti*, Playright Publishing, Sydney, 2006, 460 pp., \$70. ISBN 0 949853 98 4. The Sisters of the Good Shepherd established the Abbotsford Convent in 1863. The order's presence in Victoria has been considerable. This is a very substantial history of a notable institution that has sought to assist marginalised women and children from its inception. Over time, there has been much adaptation to meet changing community needs and expectations and these are clearly charted. A very attractive book that is copiously illustrated.

Ray Parkin, *H.M. Bark Endeavour, Her Place in History*, Miegunyah Press, Melbourne, 2006, xi + 467 pp., \$45. ISBN 0 522 85311 0. Beautifully presented, this is the paperback reissue of a considerable work on the *Endeavour*, first published in 1997 when Parkin was 87. Widely acclaimed for its insights to both Cook's ship and his voyage along the east coast of Australia in 1770, it is a tour de force written by someone with naval experience and impressive cartographic and naval architectural skills, backed by meticulous

research and an ability to enlighten his readership in words and illustrations. His notable earlier work dealt with his experiences as a POW of the Japanese during World War II.

Ray Wallace, *Riders to Your Mark, A history of cycling in Bendigo and district*, Bendigo and District Cycling Club, Bendigo, 2006, 229 pp., ISBN 0 646 45142 1. Cycling has played an important part in Australian sport as well as in transport and recreation but



there is a very limited literature. This book traces the history of cycling and cyclists in the Bendigo district from the 1880s. It is well illustrated and arranges its copious material chronologically. A labour of love, it will be of particular interest to cycling history enthusiasts as well as to Bendigo local historians.

Peter F.B. Alsop (compiler), A Catalogue Of The Library Of Philip L. Brown, Geelong, 2006, 88 pp., + CD. Philip Brown was a Fellow of RHSV, life member of the Geelong Historical Society, and impeccable editor of historical documents, notably the Clyde Company Papers, but also Foster Fyans' Memoirs, Elphinstone's Challicum Sketchbook 1842-1853, and the Todd Journal, 1835, Much of his other published work on 19th century Victorian history appeared in the Australian Dictionary of Biography, the RHSV Journal, and the Geelong Historical Society's Investigator. He also instigated the moves to create the Geelong Historical Records Centre. The fully annotated catalogue of his library and its dispersal is a masterly tribute to Brown as is the preface also written by Alsop. It is of considerable interest to the RHSV and a valuable acquisition for its library.

Peter Yule, 'the little brother', the life of George Alexander, The George Alexander Foundation, Melbourne, 41 pp., ISBN 0 646 46404 3. Based on a short autobiography written by Alexander in the late 1990s, this elegant little book presents the life story of a British child



immigrant who arrived in Australia under the

Big Brother Movement in 1926. It traces a life of successful self-improvement initially in farm jobs where he showed his inventiveness and then in garage work mostly in Koroit. His engineering and management skills were further developed in Geelong where he also taught at the Gordon and in a wartime ordinance factory at Footscray when he took courses at Melbourne Tech. He successfully invented and promoted brass fittings for plastic hoses and started his Neta factory in Hawthorn that was sold in 1972, the year he established his philanthropic foundation that came to focus on the environment and helping young talent. As a 'retired' person on the Gold Coast he became involved in real estate development. George Alexander's biographer has done this private man proud!
