Art Deco Festival launched

The heritage listed 1940 Olympic Swimming Complex in Maryborough was a fitting backdrop for the launch of the Art Deco 2008 Regional Festival



Visiting the local Art Deco gem, Arts Minister Lynne Kosky announced over \$100,000 funding for the state-wide regional festival to showcase, celebrate and promote Art Deco treasures across regional Victoria.

Ms Kosky said the month long winter event planned for September 2008 is designed to coincide with this year's Melbourne Winter Masterpieces Art Deco 1910 – 1939 at the National Gallery of Victoria.

"Regional communities will have the opportunity to put the spotlight on their own art deco treasures and draw attention to Victoria's wider Art Deco heritage"

Ms Kosky said the initiative was part of the Brumby Government's commitment to strengthening and revitalizing the community museum sector.

"Community museums play an important role in Victoria's cultural life. There are more than 700 community museums across the State. These organisations are volunteer run and care for an estimated 1.5 million cultural items", she said.

The Art Deco Festival is a joint project between the RHSV and Museums Australia (Victoria).

Report from the 97th Annual General Meeting

Some 40 members attended the Annual General Meeting which began with some general remarks from the President Professor Bill Russell:

Fe said 2007 had been a busy year framed by planning for our centenary. Towards this a motion was passed to establish an endowment fund at this AGM; and he reported on the work of the Panel of Eminent People comprising of Professor John Phillips, the Hon. John Cain, Stephen Shelmerdine, Diana Gribble and Gordon Moffatt who throughout 2007 had developed ideas for our Centenary; all of which had been adopted by Council.

It had also been a year when the History Victoria Support Group had been the "sum of its parts"; a truly co-operative effort between the group, the Society and its member societies to provide practical support and sharing amongst societies to for the development of local history skills and ideas. He said that with the demise of local Councils in the mid 1990s, historical societies were where the local community identity now lay.

2007 saw the retirement of three Councillors; Rod Benjamin, Don Gibb and Lenore Frost.

Rod Benjamin was thanked for his meticulous handling of our accounts which in seven years had brought us from a \$37,000 debt to two recent years of surplus budgets. He was also thanked for his tireless work in managing the insurance policy for the Society.

Don Gibb was thanked for his outstanding work as chair of the Publications Committee and for his work in advocacy representing the Society on the Federation of Historical Societies and the History Council of Victoria.

Lenore Frost was thanked for her practical insights into the activities of the Society and it was gratefully acknowledged that she would continue her involvement with the HVSG

Professor Russell thanked the volunteers for their magnificent work, his fellow Councillors and the Committees.

Staff members were warmly thanked and above all the "rank and file" of the Society – the members were thanked for their ongoing support

The Society elected three Fellows this year:

JOAN HUNT

Joan needs no introduction. She is our Vice President and the convenor of the History Victoria Support Group.

She is an accomplished local historian in her own right – last year producing the book Comeback to Scarsdale: Scarsdale old boys reunion centenary and has written many others and has worked tirelessly with Ballarat Geneologists, Cemetery Trusts and currently at the Ballaratt Public Record Office – but it is for her work with Historical Societies that she must receive this high acclaim. In the 1980s she received a Churchill Fellowship to study Historical Societies in England. Joan's knowledge of historical societies in Victoria, her energy, practical advice and museum expertise make her an exceptional figure in the local history world

She is always generous with her time; never ceasing to think of new ways to support the sector.

Joan superbly manages the History Victoria Support Group which has become one of the Societies greatest assets.

At a Council meeting Weston Bate once dubbed Joan St. Joan and she constantly lives up to this accolade.

CAROLE WOODS

Carole Woods is a distinguished local historian.

Her publications include: Local History in Victoria: An annotated Bibliography (1980), Beechworth, A Titan's Field (1985), Fitzroy: A Descriptive Bibliography 1989, Vision Fugitive: The Story of David Allen (1998), The Fitzroy Public Library 1877 – 1997 (2000).

She has had many entries in the Australian Dictionary of Biography and has written

regularly in the Victorian Historical Journal.

She contributes generously to the history movement in Victoria and has been very resourceful and diligent member of the Publications Committee since 1989.

In particular Carole has been one of the judges for the past 8 years of the Community History Awards – a role she undertakes with great care and sensitivity to the diversity of entries and the measure of encouragement these award bring to local history publishing in Victoria.

DR GARY PRESLAND

Gary has made a major contribution to Victorian history – particularly his study of Melbourne's natural and local history, Aboriginal history and the history of Victoria Police.

Throughout his professional and voluntary roles Gary has shown a dedication to history. In the 1980s he was an employee of the Victorian Archaeological Survey. In April 1988 he was appointed the first Manager of the Victorian Police Historical Unit, and established the Victoria Police Museum. At the same time he joined the Police Historical Society and has served on the executive ever since.

In June 1995 Gary left Victoria Police to take up a position with the Museum of Victoria which he retired from in 2000.

Gary has written extensively on Victorian history – publishing books, articles and giving talks and lectures. Later this year the Museum of Victoria will publish his book *The nature of Melbourne* based on his PHD thesis looking at the natural history of Port Phillip as it was at European Settlement.

MERIT AWARD Recipients:

Peter Alsop for his outstanding contribution to the Geelong Historical Society and in particular his major role in establishing the Geelong Historical Records Centre. He has given many talks and written papers especially on engineering matters of historical interest and he also wrote the superb bibliography of FL Brown's library that is in our collection.

Rhonda Diffey continues to make an enormous contribution to local history in the Wangarrata region. She has brought to that region enormous capabilities in exhibitions; interpretation of local history and creating networks such as the Women on Farms Heritage Group.

Explaining Alan Moorehead

Alan Moorehead was arguably the first Australian writer to command a truly international audience. From the early 1940s until his death in 1983, his series of best-selling histories of the war in North Africa, his biographies of General Montgomery and of the atomic spies, and his books on Gallipoli, the Russian Revolution, and the European penetration of Africa (notably The White Nile) and of the Pacific (The Fatal Impact) won him an immense readership. Many readers will recall also his books Cooper's Creek and Darwin and the Beagle.

How was it that a run-of-the-mill Melbourne journalist became the doyen of British war correspondents 1941-1945?

How did a self-confessed failed novelist reinvent himself as a writer of popular history? And how did Moorehead himself account for these transformations?

Introducing a discussion of Alan Moorehead's career and writings, John Lack will attempt an explanation of Moorehead's phenomenal success, and assess his overall significance to Australian cultural development.

John Lack, who is a Senior Fellow in the School of Historical Studies at the University of Melbourne, is Victorian Section Editor of the Australian Dictionary of Biography, to which he has contributed the entry on Alan Moorehead.

The secret RAAF radar station at Wilsons Promontory during WWII

At the outbreak of the 1939-45 War the Australian Government believed that Australia was not open to the threat of invasion but that we did need to prepare for sporadic raids. In November 1940 the latter became a reality with German vessels laying minefields at strategic points around the Australian coast. Our first line of defence, at the time, was a number of small signal stations capable of challenging ships for their identity. Meanwhile Britain was reaping the benefit of its timely deployment of the new and secret apparatus later to become known as radar.

When German mines claimed their first victims and Japan brought the conflict into our hemisphere Australian thinking changed radically. Plans for a chain of coastal radar stations were speedily authorized. The Wilsons promontory station was one of the first of 130 or so to be put into operation around the Australian coast.

Ian McKellar has researched and published its story in a book, much of it told by men who actually served there. He goes on to describe the equipment that they used and the method of handling the intelligence that radar stations provided. Appendices list the names of men posted there as well as many, both RAAF and WAAAF, who processed the data at the Preston Defence HQ.

In most Australian literature about droughts the term El Niño seldom appears. This is strange as most severe droughts have been the result of El Niño events. Nearly as strange is that the profound droughts of 1864-69 are often ignored or insufficiently recognised for their historical significance, even though they were some of the most severe and damaging in our colonial history.

This paper draws on a study being undertaking on the effects of three nineteenth century El Niño periods in Australia, New Zealand and the South Pacific – 1864-69, 1876-78 and 1895-1903. This lecture will focus on the 1864-69 El Niños and their effects in the eastern colonies, with particular emphasis on the pastoral industry.

Associate Professor Don Garden is an environmental historian. He is a Senior Fellow with the Australian Centre for the Study of Science, Innovation and Society at The University of Melbourne, and a Principal Fellow in the School of Historical Studies, at The University of Melbourne, He is a former Vice President of the RHSV.

His last book was Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific: an environmental history, ABC-CLIO, 2005

This talk considers the transnational world of early Australian radical and labour cartoonists, focussing upon the work of well-known artists Phil May, Livingstone Hopkins, Montague Scott, Claude Marquet, Jim Case and, most prominently, the Victorian Will Dyson. Political cartooning constituted a vitally important element of the cultural politics of the early Australian labour movement. However, most historians have assumed that the visual evidence of this period was merely confirmation of an existing or latent working-class consciousness, rather than understanding the role of iconic representation in the making and re-making of class. This talk will first show how Australian cartoonists drew on their Anglo-American backgrounds and the parallel overseas activities of the day. Secondly, in this context, it will explore the nature and purpose of their collective project, which created a populist narrative of 'heroes and villains' for political Labor: villainous capitalistic 'Fat Men' battled it out against heroic male 'workers' and a more collective vision of 'the People'. Nick Dyrenfurth is a political historian who lectures in the School of Historical Studies at Monash University. He wrote his PhD was on the cultural politics of the early Australian labour movement. this year. He is also currently converting his thesis into a book provisionally titled 'Heroes and Villains: the Culture of Australian Labour, 1878-1918'.

The evening will be shared with Peter Burke who will speak on Workplace based Football.

Victoria poised for a return to the Art Deco Era



Throughout September 2008 regional Victoria is invited to celebrate the Art Deco 1914 – 1945 era.

In a sector development partnership Museums Australia (Victoria) and the Royal Historical Society of Victoria have received State Government funding to deliver the Art Deco Regional Festival across Victoria, timed to coincide with the National Gallery of Victoria's Winter Masterpieces Exhibition *Art Deco 1910 – 1939* from London's Victoria and Albert Museum from 28 June to 5 October 2008.

So don't be surprised to see the Charleston in full swing, dance bands, vintage cars, films, bakelite, walking tours and colourful Art deco fashions and stories being told about the 20's and 30's just about everywhere.

Throughout regional Victoria community museums, historical societies, and art galleries hold wonderful examples of Art Deco in their collections, together with wonderful examples of art deco styling in streetscapes and local buildings such as the Warracknabeal Town Hall, Wimmera Livestock Bazaar, (Horsham), Theatre Royal (Castlemaine), Municipal Olympic Swimming Pool (Maryborough), Wycheproof Shire Hall and the RexTheatre (Charlton).

The aim of the Festival will be to build partnerships between groups with Art Deco collections and interests, and to create shared opportunities for marketing and the development of skills in cultural tourism.

Janice Haynes (formerly Director of Her Majesty's Theatre, Ballarat) has been appointed as the 2008 Art Deco Regional Festival coordinator to provide management, facilitation and network advice to the project, devolve the funding and travel to the regional areas to assist groups with their planning and delivery of Festival events.

The Art Deco 2008 Regional Festival logo was designed by Peter Lambert Design Works, Ballarat. The font is a variant on Huxley Vertical designed in 1936. The bars of the A, E and F are low and project to the left; the R is curled and all the characters are elongated.

The 'flying V' represents the shape of the state of Victoria. The wings are evocative of Victoria's abundant bird life – brolgas, egrets and ibis with inspiration drawn from Sydney Long's 1919 painting *Spirit of the Plains*, and are also redolent of a 1930's car grill. The green colour is as close as possible a pantone match to the Art Deco shade 'Eau de Nil'.

Podcasting comes to the RHSV

From the beginning of June the Royal Historical Society of Victoria will include podcasts on its website.

ne of the issues from the RHSV survey of members in 2006 was the need to make the lectures held at the RHSV, especially at evening meetings, available to those unable to attend. During 2008 many of the lectures held at the RHSV will be recorded and made available on the Podcast Page of the RHSV website. Those interested in listening to a recording of the lectures can download the audio files to listen to on a computer or to transfer to a portable digital player (such as an iPod). The initial lectures to go online cover an interesting range of topics - thoroughbred horse racing, teachers who became soldiers during World War One, George Langley and onion growing in Gippsland. Other audio files will be added during the year.

In 2007 the RHSV received a grant from the Telematics Trust to set up the facilities for recording lectures and making them and other aural resources available online as podcasts and also to make information on how to do this available to societies. A workshop, Introduction to Podcasting, will be held at the RHSV on Saturday 19 July from 1.00 pm to 3.30 pm. Topics to be covered during the workshop include general information about audio files and podcasts, an overview of equipment and programs for editing audio files, recording audio files, editing audio files, putting audio files online (including the use of RSS) and accessing audio files online.

Blogs

Two blogs (web logs) have recently been added to the Affiliated Societies section of the RHSV website under the heading - Resources for historical societies. The Information technology for local history collections blog provides information relating to IT projects that historical societies may be undertaking. The initial posts are based on two projects currently being undertaken at the RHSV - podcasting and online exhibitions. Information about each section of the project is added to the blog as the project progresses. It therefore provides information on how a project may be undertaken but is not a definitive guide. Initial posts in the Cataloguing guide for historical societies blog provide general information on computer cataloguing including choosing a program. Other posts will be based largely on Frequently Asked Questions and should provide a useful resource for those using computers to catalogue collections.

The RHSV News blog can be accessed from the front page of the RHSV website and provides the latest information about RHSV events and news items that are announced between the issues of *History News*.

My Connected Community

My Connected Community (mc²) groups are still the major tool used by the RHSV to encourage communication, sharing of ideas and networking between members of groups and to keep group members up to date with information about events, grants, workshops and new publications. Check the RHSV website for information on joining mc2 and the range of history related mc² groups.

Online exhibitions

Online exhibitions are a great way to extend the information relating to an exhibition held at a society. They can also form an exhibition in their own right to be viewed online rather than in an exhibition space in a building.

The RHSV website currently includes an online exhibition - MacRobertson's Round Australia Expedition 1928. Eighty years ago MacPherson Robertson sponsored a five month expedition using two trucks and an oldsmobile to travel around Australia, primarily through outback areas. For this project the expedition has been divided into eight stages with information about each stage, including photographs taken by members of the expedition party, released following the time frame of the original trip which left Melbourne on 12th April, 1928. The RHSV holds a collection of albums, scrapbooks, a manuscript of the trip and a few artefacts relating to MacPherson Robertson and his company, Mac Robertson's. Digitised records from this collection were used for this online exhibition which can be viewed on the RHSV website - www.historyvictoria.org.

In 2005 a group of volunteers from the RHSV and the GSV transcribed the names of the women who signed *The Monster Petition* in 1891 for women in Victoria to have the right to vote. Members from a number of organisations collected the signatures for the petition in 1891 but the main organiser of the petition was the Woman's Christian Temperance Union (WCTU). Information about collecting the signatures for the petition has been researched and collected for an online exhibition, *The Woman's Petition and the WCTU* which will be able to be viewed on the RHSV website in June.

Memorials Database

The *Memorials Database* was added to the *Treasures of the RHSV* section of the website last year. If anyone has images of any of the sites included in the database and is prepared to allow the images to appear online, low resolution jpg files of the image with reference to the memorial can be sent to the RHSV to be attached to the record of the memorial in the database.

The RHSV will continue to utilise some of the growing range of Internet resources to provide information services for our members and promote local history in Victoria.


Colin Cleary, *Ballarat Labor from miner hesitancy to golden age*, Colin Cleary, 24 Goynes Rd., Epsom, 3551, 2007, pp. xvi + 321. There are few studies of the labour movement at the local level over a considerable time. The author has followed up his book on the Bendigo labour movement with this substantial piece on Ballarat. There is a detailed examination of the trade union movement, of federal and state elections, and of the people involved. Not surprisingly, there is an overall argument that Ballarat has a distinctive and important labour history. Cleary provides clear advocacy for continuing labour activism in rural and regional Victoria.

Maggie MacKellar, Strangers in a foreign land: the journal of Niel Black and other voices from the Western District, Miegunyah Press and State Library of Victoria, Melbourne, 2008, pp. xii + 307, \$26-95. ISBN 9780522855128. The bulk of this attractive book comprises the full text of Niel Black's journal, much used by Margaret Kiddle in her Men of Yesterday. This makes a welcome addition to published material on Western District squatters and squatting. In addition, the author draws on material held by the State Library to convey the experiences of other Western District settlers. Her debt to Kiddle is fully acknowledged in a lively introduction and concluding chapters.




John Murphy, *One bag in six : onion growing in Gippsland 1900-2007*, Leongatha and District Historical Society Inc., 2007, pp. 97. ISBN 978-0-9593231-5-3. A very informative account of the development of onion growing in the area around Leongatha written by someone not only with first-hand experience but also a keen eye for significance and context, and with a direct and purposeful style. John Murphy, a fellow of the society, has served local history well in Gippsland and this latest publication reinforces what has been appreciated for a long time.

Paul Nicholls, *Highs and lows: the Anglican Parish of Christ Church Brunswick, 1855-2002*, Christ Church Press, Brunswick, 2007, pp. xiii + 337. ISBN 978-0-9804329-0-9. This splendid book by a



recently retired history academic carefully details the life and work of a parish church in interesting detail; it relates the history of the parish to change not only within the Anglican church but also in the wider society; it contributes immensely to our understanding of the suburb

of Brunswick; and while it may be 'the story of Melbourne Anglicanism in microcosm' as the present Anglican

archbishop suggests (p. ix), it is also a model for what institutional histories can be and often are not.
