As both my wife Cicely and I were born during the early years of the 2nd World War we both have memories of the precarious times during the bombing. We were both evacuated from the age of about four to safer places with our mums and siblings to Wales and Lancashire respectively.

I can vividly remember sitting with my mother and sister under the stairs. happily crayoning on the walls with the flickering light of two candles whilst the occasional explosion of a dropped bomb made the whole house shudder.

We rarely used the shelter out in the back garden which was rather amusing as, after returning home after the war had ended, we realised that the gas meters were located underneath the stairs where we had sheltered for some time and we were lucky that the pipes hadn't leaked or the candles hadn't caused an explosion!
